Treasurer Tom Castronuova will have extra application forms at the January 31 meeting in case you might need some for your friends.




Photo of ENIAC taken from a poster hanging in Jerry Behler's CoCo Den.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY ENIAC by Jerry Behler

ENIAC (Electronic Numerical Integrator and Calculator) will celebrate its 40th "birthday" on February 13.

What makes ENIAC so special? ENIAC was the world's first electronic computer, developed at the University of Pennsylvania.

ENIAC was invented and developed by J. Presper Eckert and John Mauchly, opening an entirely new and promising field of computers.

Its calculation speed was 1000 times faster than the current electromechanical machines. After completion, it did nuclear-physics calculations in two hours that would have taken 100 engineers one year.

ENIAC was far from a portable computer, it weighed over 30 tons, contained over 18,000 vacuum tubes, 70,000 resistors, 10,000 capacitors, 6,000 switches, 1,500 relays. It used as much electrical power as a locomotive.

By today's standard, ENIAC's computing power was equivalent to our hand held calculators. Years ago ENIAC was disassembled and distributed to museums across the country.

Happy Birthday ENIAC.


NEW SUPER COMPUTER ARRIVES

Cray Research Inc., the maker of most of the world's 140 supercomputers, recently unveiled the latest Cray 2 supercomputer.

The \$17.6 million computer is the world's fastest with 240,000 chips in a semicircular cabinet the size of a hot tub and filled with liquid fluorocarbons to the chips cool. It has 2 BILLION bytes of memory, more than that of all the personal computers sold in the United States last year.

It can perform between 600 million and 1.2 billion calculations a second - three to five times the speed of the 3-year-old Cray X-MP. The best conventional mainframe computers perform only 5 million calculations a second.

The computer, and the company expects to sell about 40 this coming year, is for use by governments, automobile and aircraft designers, oil companies and universities,
