

A serial interface (such as the Color Computer uses) sends data one bit at a time. A parallel interface sends data a byte at a time over eight parallel paths.

RECYCLE CASSETTE PRINTER RIBBONS

You can rewind your expensive cassette printer ribbons as much as six times and still be able to read the printout with ease if you take care and follow the these simple steps.

Remove the external rubber-band drive. Most cassette or cartridge shells have a peg-and-hole friction cover. Gently open the cover with a flat blade (if a few pegs break off, use tape to shut the cover later).

Note the pathway and direction of the ribbon as it winds around pulleys, drive gears, and the tension mechanism. Remove the loose parts (like pulleys, drive gears) which could get lost accidentally during the re-winding process. Leave the spools in the shell.

Remove the tensioner and arrange the ribbon so it travels directly from spool to spool.

Rewind the ribbon from the take-up spool back onto the supply spool applying tension to the take-up spool. Some spools have holes where a rod can be inserted and spun by hand or with a reversible drill. Otherwise, a bit of stickum on your finger might help as you spin the supply spool. Periodically press down high spots on the rewound ribbon. Don't worry if the rewound ribbon appears irrregular. Also, variable winding speeds and tension might make it difficult to rewind the ribbon completely.

Reinstall the parts you removed, and restore the ribbon to its original pathway.

Press the cover back on. Replace the external rubber-band drive and mark the cassette as being rewound.

EXCLUDE-A-PHONE PROTECTS YOUR PHONE LINE

A device which isolates your modem to prevent an extension phone from interfering with computer transmissions has been announced by R.K. Burtchaell Co., 516 SE Morrison, Suite 201, Portland, DR 97214 (800) 342-5752.

The device is known as Hy-Tek's Exclude-A-Phone and is easily installed and operates off the phone's power supply.
