Welcome to the Library Car on the April 1991 run of the 6809 Express. You may notice I've picked up some of the mess you had to walk around last month. Still, be careful you don't trip over the piles of stuff I've yet to finish sorting.

I went through the library looking for anything that might have to do with word processing and found a few interesting files. Most of the club's disks I found with word processors are from the early to mid 1980's. One was from 1986. This means most were written for the COCO 1 and 2. The last one was for the COCO 3. I've tried running several of the older ones on my COCO 3 and found only one that didn't immediately hangup the system. This was a program called Word-Master. Word-Master is from 1983 and distributed by Pyramid Distributors. is one of those gems for which I've been able to find a manual.

This is NOT a what-you-see-is-what-get word processor, so the formatting of the text is not easy. It does have most everything else a small word processor would be expected to have. The buffer size is automatically adjusted for the amount of memory it finds. As this is for a COCO 2, the manual refers to a 16K, 32K and 64K machine. It does not specify how large a buffer can be expected in a given size machine, but in a 64K machine it does use the upper 32K. This would mean a buffer over 32k in size as some of the buffer would still reside in the lower 32K. Because of the lack of easy text formatting, I would recommend this word processor only for program editing. One could use it for letter writing, but it would take considerable experience and educated judgement to get the letter to print out correctly the first time. However, if you don't have a word processor of your own, this one will get you going.

In going through the manuals to find the one for the above word processor, I found a copy of a manual for Computerware's Color Scribe III. I'd previously missed the disk. This is the program from 1986 for the COCO 3. This one does it all. won't go into all the commands for the manual is some 45 pages long! This one allows editing files larger than the buffer. For those of you who tend to be long winded (like me), this can be a real The choice of screen size are 40x24, 64x24, and 80x24. In the 80x24 one can almost get a wysiwyg screen. (W-hat Y-ou S-ee I-s W-hat Y-ou G-et) If you really want a preview, you can call up the FOrmatter and "print" the document to the screen. Imbedded printer codes are possible and are not predefined by the software, so one can create documents for what ever printer one happens to have

hung on the system. If you are not already "into" another word processor, this looks like a good one.


