>My text appears small on my screen but still very readable so I was not aware of this problem. It is easy to fix but I need to know if it is a problem

with this person's browser or not. My browser allows me to set text size as Small, Medium, or Large. I have it at small. My HTML size also ranges from -2 and up. Maybe -2 is too small for his browser? Roger

Hi Roger,

Your correspondent is correct.

I'm still waiting 2 minutes for a complete page at 56K. Here's why: Never use the browser to re-scale the images. For example, the "coke break" image is 608x464, and you are asking the browser to resize it to 127x96. The whole picture still has to be downloaded to accomplish this. That pix is 51K and if that's representative of all the image file sizes on the left of the page, then you're asking roughly 13x51K=663K of pix downloads alone. Adding in the icons and text, the homepage is probably around 800K of data. Also, your page tries to launch an embedded document of some kind, for which I have a warning, I automatically reject it. I don't know what it is, so I don't let it run. If it's a sound file or some such, you should be aware that embedded sound is unacceptable to users with speech readers, interrupting or overlaying the text reading.

As for the text, my display is 19-inch 1280x1024, and the page is nearly unreadable. If it were anything but dark on light text, it would be totally impossible. -2 is never recommended as a size, except for very occasional footnote- or credit-style material and legal jargon. The bottom end for accessibility is -1.

There was a thread some months ago on bit.listserv.coco about this issue, and everyone got cranky about it, but there are folks out there who have issues with font sizes, download speeds, and media interruptions. You might also check <http://orbitaccess.com/> and <http://www.w3.org/WAI/> for further accessibility information. Best to you, Dennis

If you are running my edition of the drivers, just about any ATA hard drive will do (-1, -2, -3) except for removable platter ones. Also, any ATAPI stuff won't work (other than the GetStat to find out what kind of drive it is).

If you are running the original driver, it should work on most ATA-2 and above drives. I will only work on the original ATA-1 drives if that drive actually uses and accepts the "reprogram drive geometry" command, but will not work if the drive does not support it.

Jim, good to hear you finally got your IDE and that Carl is again filling those orders. As secretary of the Glenside Color Computer Club, we in the club were concerned that after all our efforts that there were still customers out there that had still not received their orders.

I trust that you have never been to a Chicago CoCoFEST as I cannot remember ever meeting you. At our fest there have been many fine IDE DRIVES available for sale that work with your interface. I would try to find a drive that was until

recently used in an IBM platform machine where the user changed out the drive for a 2 to 13+ gig drive. These older drives would be in the 250 to 900 Meg size. They should go for less than \$20 - \$30. There are older IDE drives, some used by Commodore, that will not work. Carl can tell you why.

The drives I mention will hold so much stuff - it will knock your socks off, maybe every program you have in your present library! This is because the CoCo is an 8 bit machine and the programs are written well and compact for such a machine.

HELPDESK 911

Mark Marlette wrote:

I would like to make a disk SSDD 35 track that would have a RSDOS and OS-9 partitions on the disk. My distributions are starting to have both and I don't want to supply two disks. Disto use to do it with his stuff. Is there a utility available that will do this? If not, can someone explain what needs to be done for this? Heck maybe I could.

First, I'm not that familiar with OS-9 so don't shoot me if I get the OS-9 side of this wrong :)

What you can try is:

-Format a 35 track disk in RSDOS.

-Use a sector editor to edit the second sector of track 17.

Fill the first 34 bytes of the sector with filler bytes, lets say decimal 88.

-Boot OS-9 and then reformat the same disk, but specify that the disk is only 17 tracks in size (tracks 0 to 16)

The filler bytes lock out the first 17 (0-16) tracks of the disk from use by RSDOS, leaving tracks (17-34) free for RSDOS, and then OS-9 only uses the first 17 tracks itself. Not being familiar with OS-9, I'm not sure what you have to do to format a disk that's only 17 tracks, but I'm pretty sure it's as simple as specifying the number of tracks to format.

RSDOS puts the directory on track 17, and I think OS-9 puts it on track 0. That's why that split-up point was chosen. If you want to reserve more space for the OS-9 side of the disk, that's possible too, but it becomes more complicated. The OS-9 disk would have to leave track 17 untouched even if it does use tracks beyond that. On the RSDOS side of things, it's just a matter of filling the disks GAT table so it won't write over the OS-9 portion of the disk.
