



Saturday Sessions: FWD Computing:




Frank Davis gave a review and demo of products. One was the E-Bay tool kit. Another was a product that would allow a small business or a family to offer a wireless service just like they do a Starbucks. Next was PC On Steroids, with this program you can defrag 3 times faster than the usual defragging program, you get an improved Hard Drive search, and furthermore, your computer can be setup so that if it is stolen and the thief starts the computer, the police and you will be notified. Pretty neat. Then there was X-video that gives you the ability to make conversions between many kinds of video formats. Next was something called Particle Illusion SE which offers a whole array of special effects.

Cloud-9:

Mark and Boisy gave a report on the process they are making on the Super Board which should be out soon.





It will include: SCSI and IDE on the board, 2 meg of RAM, 2 serial ports, 1 parallel port, PS2 keyboard, PS2 mouse, V-ROM and maybe VGA.



They mentioned a super-bus and a drive-wire device that allows you to use a PC as a slave and gives access to the PC's hard drive.

Then Frank Davis went on to talk and demo some of the many other products FWD has to offer, including enhanced music CD's of artists For the FEST! he brought some old PCs that he had rigged up to boot to the CoCo screen, and sold them for a very reasonable price.



He has fixed the emulator so that the user can use real joysticks, and use a full keyboard.

specific computer. A firewall can block access to a computer by setting up user defined rules about whom or what has access. A firewall can be the first line of defense. One kind of firewall is NAT, network address translation which hides your computer from the internet. Some routers come with built in hardware firewalls. Either kind of firewall might be the best depending on the needs of the user.

Another kind of attack is viruses. There are several software packages such as Zone Alarm, Norton Antivirus, MacAfee, AVG and probably shareware and freeware.





He demonstrated some other features of the emulator including key combinations, changing options on the fly except for memory, and flipping between virtual and real floppies. Good work, David.

Sunday's Session: Justin Wagner:

Justin presented an excellent discussion of internet security. He mentioned that any computer is vulnerable and went on to present the kinds of threats and possible solutions and their trade-offs. Part one dealt with firewalls and to begin Justin told how the baddies out there might find anyone of us. Some of them might find us by looking randomly or with a more opportunistic broad search or they my employ a coordinated approach by attacking a



Justin mentioned an anti-virus called AVG at www.grisoft.com. At that site they say "Tough of viruses, easy on users". Another program mentioned was from Avast, www.avast.com. I went to these sites and they appear to be commercial products. The important thing with any package is to keep it up to date with the latest versions and with the latest protections against the newest viruses.

Justin mentioned some signs of problems, including spontaneous rebooting, failed services, sluggish GUI behavior, excessive disk or network activities, low disk space, etc.

Two newer kinds of computer problems are spyware and malware. Spyware is information stored on our computers that can pass information on to venders about who you are. A source to help with this problem is www.lavasoftus.com . I went to that site and they do have a free version at download.com. For malware Justin mentioned Spybot S&D at www.safer_networking.org . I just went to that site and they also have a free version.

Justin suggested that both of the free versions would be adequate for home owners.



He noted that at the end of 2003 we lost 36 paid members and at the end of 2004 we lost another 37 paid members. It is paid memberships that pay for the printing and mailing of our newsletters and help pay for Glenside CoCoFEST!s each year. Howard publicly thanked Tony for this provision.

New Business:

Bob Swoger told the membership of the details on the making of this years collectable teeshirts. Tony's CoCo 1, present at the fest, was used for the photograph. Jim Johnson, a graphic artist for The Baptist Bulletin, a G.A.R.B.C. publication, cleaned up the picture and added the artwork around it to become this years Logo. 


New Business: Frank Hogg alive and well. He has been found in NY at a summer retreat using a web page search.


