MODULAR PROGRAMMING By Carl England

Since most programs do many of the same things--clear the screen, print text, read a disk, etc., it is a waste of time to keep re-writing the same routines every time you write a program. The most efficient way of programming is to have several handy general-purpose routines available to build your main program around. This method is very useful when writing in high-level languages like BASIC. But its real value becomes evident when writing ASSEMBLY. Good, bug-free, modules won't crash your program; this allows you to devote your attention to the main routine.

Program modules should be as flexible as possible. If you have a module that only prints to the screen, then you will need another module to send data to the printer. It is better to use a module that will print to either, even

EDITOR'S ECHO By Russ Keller

This is September '94 and the CoCo Fest is the First and second of next month. See ya all there!!! It was sugested last night to give advance notice of upcoming meetings so plans may be formulated for attendance for night workers to be off for meetings. NOTICE !!! Read your address lable as all expired members will be deleated from the mailing list next month. Dues will be accepted at the CoCo Fest next month. if you don't need the flexibility now--you probably will later.

DOCUMENTATION is important (in capital letters!). Give your module a name. Print what it will do. List the entry and the exit conditions. Don't forget to name any registers that are modified by the module.

To use the modules, you simply append them to your main routine, or if you are using DISK EDTASM, then you should use the INCLUDE command.

The following module clears the lo-resolution text screen:

Notice that there is no end statement. An end statement would cause the assembler to terminate prematurely. The only end statement you need is at the end of the main routine.

Notice that instead of "re-inventing the wheel", I chose to use a gerneral-purpose print routine already available to me. Address \$A002 is a documented routine called CHROUT (see your BASIC manual). It is always safe to use the documented routines, but be careful when calling an undocumented portion of ROM. Different versions of your BASIC ROM may have routines at different locations (this is especially true with disk routines). Next I have a little program to test these two modules:

If you are using EDTASM+ or SuperPatched EDTASM+, then the INCLUDE command won't be available to you. In that case just load the PRINT and CLH modules before typing in the rest of the program.

Next month I will give you a general-purpose module for performing disk I/O.
