devoured). OPPS, I forgot to tell you the hidden message.





DEAR MEMBERS:

Let me try to explain what I was trying to say.....(sweat, sweat)

Computer users seem to fall into two distinct groups. One group being the entertainment addicts and the other the utility or "business" addicts.

Those in the entertainment section want a computer at reasonable cost to provide games, adventures, and fun programs, with the aim of sneaking computer literacy into the kids without them knowing it. (there is absolutely nothing wrong with that, I support it wholeheartedly) The CoCo provides exactly what they are looking for, no question about it, and because it is expandable and powerful, can be used to a certain extent for utility and business purposes.

They wanted to be able to use the computer for word processing, spread sheet accounting, data base use, etc. These people try to learn as much as they can about the computer and what it will do, and will spend a lot more money expanding the systems by adding up to 4 disk drives, printers, modems, graphics boards, speech and music synthesizers, hi-res monitors etc.

These people will be the most likely beneficiaries of the expanded capabilities of the COCOIII.

The COCOIII probably won't have much if any, better entertainment software. The returns just won't be there for a software author to come up with a "great 128K game" considering the time and effort that will be required to write these monster games.

HOWEVER.....(and I should have mentioned this before), those that have a pile of hardware such as disk drives, monitors, etc. will be able to connect all their clap trap to the COCOIII and have a very capable machine for a reasonable cost. Under OS9 level 2 they will now be able to use the expanded memory and run some decent OS9 software, something they could not do with the COCOI or COCOII because of memory constraints.

Also, the fact that Radio Shack dropped the price of the COCOII from \$329.00 to \$199.00 even before it hit the shelves, also makes it look better.

But, I still feel that the thing is too late to attract a lot of NEW buyers. (which is the point I was trying to make in the last newsletter) Why? Because when you add the price of the COCOIII, MONITOR, and DISK DRIVE up, you are somewhere around \$700 which is not far from the price of an MS DOS clone, which is, for better or worse, becoming the industry standard.

A fair number of people in our club have MS DOS machines at work. It is inevitable that they will be moving up to MS DOS computers at home. So...we will be forming a special interest group for those people. There is no reason that both groups can't co-exist. After all we are all there for fellowship, education, fun and to further the use and knowledge of computers. Besides, there is no doubt in my mind that most if not all, of the MS DOS'ers will keep their COCOs for entertainment and the occasional return to the great computer that got them started. I, for one will certainly keep my COCO warm.

I hope that someone will take the initiative to start a COCOIII group. There is lots of room and lots of interest. If you are considering it, let myself or one of the Activity Committee know and we will help as much as we can. Or just bring your stuff to the meetings, people will find you and things will start rolling all by themselves.

The above comments are strictly those of the editor. (Harry) I could be completely wrong about my predictions. I'm sure many of you will let me know if I am. You can bet that I will let you know if I was right. Let's see what happens.



Dwarf-throwing contest criticized

DUNNOICE, ONTALIO BRISBANE, Australia (Reuter) — Organizers of a dwarf-throwing contest between Britain and Australia dismissed a public outcry against the event today, saying the little people are "professional projectiles" who do not feel degraded.

The two teams, each with a dwarf and a thrower, will be vying for The Ashes—an incinerated copy of Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs—named after the top cricket trophy contested by the two countries.

The British team members are thrower Roy Merrin and dwarf Lenny the Giant. The Australian sidehas thrower David Berry and dwarf Wee Robbie. No team member has made any public comment on the contest.

Matches begin next Tuesday and will be held in Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne with the proceeds donated to charity.

The series has sparked widespread criticism from the public, politicians and the Little People's Association, but Queensland Police Minister Bill Gunn said today there was no law to stop it.

"It is degrading and sorrowful that promoters have to stoop to this sort of entertainment, but we have no scope to act on it," he told reporters.

The Little People's Association said it

The Little People's Association said it had written to all state health ministers protesting against the competition.

David Naylor, editor of People magazine which is sponsoring the contest, rejected the criticism today. "They (dwarfs) don't feel degraded," he said. "They are professional projectiles."

Each team will hurl its dwarf several times and the side with the longest throw will win the first stage of the contest.

In the second stage, a dwarf will be strapped to a skateboard, with roller skates attached to his hands, and bowled down an aisle several times. The team which knocks down most pins or skittles will be the winner.




won't mention his name because he knows who he is and maybe now he understands our positions a little better now.

Where Is The Mainstream Going?

The other evening we were sitting around playing "The PC Game" this is not a program but a sort of role playing game where you invent some fantastic feature for any personal computer, or a totally new personal computer. Given the great features of this new product, you try to determine how well it would do on the market.

After a while someone postulated the theory that given the current state of the personal computer market, nothing would do well if it upset the status quo. After talking about this depressing idea for a while, we all became convinced that it was indeed true.

The mainstream is MSDOS, IBM-compatible computers. Its headwater flows from 8088-powered, MSDOS computers downstream toward 80386 AT type computers running some type of MSDOS-compatible Unix system. Possibly at the mouth of this mainstream there will be a wide delta with many varing streams emerging into the wide sea, but no one can see that far ahead.

There are some other streams flowing into the sea, mainly the M68000 with tributaries called Macintosh, Atari and Amiga and many other small brooklets, but the important system draining the computer watershed is obviously the IBM/intel System.

The current in the mainstream is so strongly IBM that any attempt to diverge results in disaster. If you doubt this look at companies like DEC, Epson, Heath, Sanyo, TI, Tandy and Victor all of whom built non-IBM PC compatible MSDOS computers. They found out very quickly that you either joined the mainstream or went out of business. The DEC Rainbow, TI PRO, Victor 9000, the Epson QX-16, the Heath 1000, Sanyo 555 and Tandy 2000 were all machines that had excellent features and who's owners liked them for those features. A few of them are still being sold but they are really not factors in the business anymore. Hardly any software is being written for them and software is the engine that drives the market. The minute the software publishers decide that there are not enough of any "special version" computers to make it worth while to maintain that version, they

dump it and reduce their expenses.

That is the law of the marketplace and although some small software publishers may make a living supporting obsolete computers, or small population computers, very few new programs are written to support old machines.

The mainstream is so strong that even IBM itself can not buck it. If IBM came out with a PC that used a proprietary operating system, it would fail because it could not use all the software that has already been created. The mere name IBM is no longer enough to assure the success of a computer, Big Blue learned that expensive lesson with the PCir. Whereas IBM originally supplied 80% of the PCs, they are down to about 40%, with clones making up the vast majority.

'Clones,' that is a misleading name if ever there was one. Is a Compaq, or a Tandy, or any other PC/XT/AT type MSDOS computer a clone any longer? Perhaps they are generic computers each of which may have some unique feature. There are now a lot of large business and governmental purchasing departments who no longer buy this type of computer by brand names. If the user says the machine is compatible with the software to be used and the price is the low bid, they buy the computer regardless of the logo on the front panel.

In spite of this willingness to try any compatible MSDOS computer that carries FCC and UL approval, just try to introduce a non-compatible system into the company, lab, or factory. You will find yourself fighting purchasing, data processing, standards department and management on all levels. Personal computers have been around long enough so that everyone knows the real cost of introducing a new system into the corporate environment. It is sad but true that anyone who introduced a better mouse trap today would have to do a lot more than proving it caught more mice, before the world made a beaten path to its door! How cost effective is the new trap with regard to education. maintenance, spares provisioning, replacement and so on?

Up to this point, I have been talking about hardware clones, computers and plug-in boards, but did you realize that the

production of Software Clones has reached an all time high? We receive a constant flow of press releases and review copies of software just issued that turns out to be another, Sidekick, Lotus, Wordstar, dBase, SuperCalc, etc. Each of these programs has one claim to fame, they sell for a fraction of the cost of the original and are usually not copy-protected. Now these are not pirated copies, or stolen software, they are software clones which may be defined as a program that does the same thing as another program but is not identical in structure. What the legal implications of software clones are, is a can of worms I do not propose to get involved in. We have all known since the start of programming, that once the destination is known there are countless roads to get there. That is why the Patent Office refused to grant patents on software in the first place. A

Lotus Corporation can keep a clone maker tied up in the courts until they go out of business, but even they can not go after countless clones. We do not quite take the same attitude toward software clones as we do towards pirated software, yet it may be said that, "he who steals my code is a pirate and may be stopped according to law, but he who steals my ideas is a competitor and there isn't anything I can do about it."

When Adam Osborne announced his company, Paperback Software, he made one of his industry pronouncements, that software was priced too high and there was room for reasonably priced software clones to find a place in the market. He was right and today these programs exist and are a factor that must be considered. The big software publishers are now willing to sell company multi-use licenses

for their software, or at leto give multi piece discount amount to the same thing. This would never have happened if the software clones did not exist.

We have only one other comment on the direction of the mainstream and that is an observation on what is in the sea toward which the stream flows. There are those who will tell you that the name of the sea is Unix, and perhaps they are right for multi-user systems and LANS. I for one do not think so, I predict that MSDOS has a life of its own and will develop into a far more complex structure than we can visualize today. It will be a system for all users and will allow both simple and complex applications. It will support all types of graphics, communications and mass storage devices including semi-conductor cache memory and optical

MS-DOS PRICES

The week after our last meeting, I went on a little excursion to Toronto to check out the prices on some MS-DOS machines that were advertised in the Toronto Star. It was a store that had just opened up the week before.

What I found was what looked like a battle zone.

The salesman that served me said that this was the first day that there wasn't a 20 minute lineup at the cash register. There wasn't much left on the shelves either (I think that explains the short lineup that day). The salesman said that they were expecting a new shipment in at any time. They had been pretty well been cleaned out.

I did get prices on some of their systems. They seemed to be fairly reasonable considering the price of a comparable IBM machine.

Here's what we (Penguin Jr. and myself) found:

Base XT- Compatible system

1-360K DS/DD floppy drive 256K on a 640K motherboard Phoenix Bios (an IBM-compatible operating system) 150 Watt power supply 6 month warranty Price: \$599.00

This system is still missing a few things to run the computer. Unfortunately these computers are not like the old reliable COCO where you buy the computer and just hook it up to your T.V. set and away you go.

This Base system still needs a graphics board for you to hook up a monitor to. If you have a printer you also need either a parallel or serial port. All of these little extras begin to add up to quite a bit. One must beware when buying a MS-DOS machine to make sure what comes with the machine. There was also an upgraded model to the above machine

System 2 - XT-compatible system

1-360K DS/DD floppy drive
640K on the motherboard
Hercules-compatible monochrome graphics display card
parallel printer port
Phoenix Bios
4.77 MHz and 8 MHz speeds
150 Watt power supply
6 month warranty
Price: \$795.99

OR

System 3 - XT-compatible system

same as above with 2-360K DS/DD floppy drives Price: \$895.00

Both of these systems are ready to go. All you need is a monitor for the computer and a couple of cables for the monitor and the printer (if you have one).

They also sold monitors with prices ranging from \$144.00 for and amber monitor to \$750.00 for and enhanced graphics color display. The enhanced color diplay was being demonstrated in the store on an AT-Compatible machine and the pictures on the screen were life-like.

NRCC-NL40

This was not strictly the monitor that produced the pictures but also the enhanced graphics board that was installed in the machine. When you look at this kind of equipment you are looking at a lot of money (definitely a lot for me anyways).

Now we work our way into the big times. I also got a price on one of the AT-compatibles that was on display. I also got a price of a machine from a company in California. First the Toronto store:

Packard Bell AT-compatible

Self-testing diagnostic diskette 640K on 1MB motherboard 6 or 8 MHz CPV parallel, serial and clock ports 1-1.2 MB Disk drive MS-DOS 3.1 200 Watt power supply Phoenix Bios Hard disk controller card 1 year warranty Price: \$2978.55 (YYYYEEEEECCCCHHHH!!!!)

Definitely not a Christmas gift for the kids unless your last name is Onassis or Getty. There is also a California firm which offers what appears to be a better product for about half the price. Here it goes:

SAM3001

1 MB on an American-made motherboard 6 or 10 MHz CPU 2 serial and 1 parallel port 1-1.2 MB disk drive Hercules-compatible mono/graphics or RGB/graphics card 192 Watt power supply Hard disk controller Card Handles 2 hard and 2 floppy drives 90 day parts and labour warranty Price: approx. \$1500.00 Canadian

This computer offers more memory as well as being faster than the machine from the Toronto store. This machine is ready to go, where the Canadian machine still needs a graphics card for a monitor. It certainly helps to shop around.

The American machine was reviewed in the October 28 issue of PC Magazine along with 7 other machines. Of the 8 machines tested this one came out on top. The editor's summary said that "HiTech International's SAM3001 stands out for several reasons. It's components, especially the maxi-switch keyboard, are of high quality. It's clock runs at 6 and 10 MHz, giving it a speed advantage. And the backing of the Korean company Samsung makes it a fairly low-risk purchase."

You may have seen that company name in the Computer Shopper. They also produce monitors. I am going to try and write to the company in California and try and get more information on these machines before the next meeting. You can be sure that if we do get some information Harry will be discussing this at the next meeting. If any of you might be interested in this machine, let Harry, Bill White or myself know as we are seriously considering purchasing these California machines.

We are planning on sending an order on or about November 15th.

For comparison purposes an actual IBM XT machine with less memory than the machines quoted earlier would be approximately \$2200.00 U.S. and an AT machine would be approximately \$3200.00 U.S.. These machines are naturally "bare-bones" versions which would bring the price up even higher for upgrades. Obviously clones are the only way to go for the "everyday" person.

Now that we have got some of you completely confused over these machines, it time to move on.

VIP WRITER

Scruffy has started his VIP Writer seminars again but there was only two people there last month. Maybe we'll get more people next month. Tim will keep putting these seminars on as long as there is interest in the seminars. If any of you have been wondering about VIP Writer, Tim is the man to see. Harry and myself use VIP Writer to do the club newsletter (and doesn't it look impressive!!!!). It certainly is a lot easier to type something on a screen and correct it before it gets printed out. This program was used once by myself to type a Master's thesis (100 typed pages). Definitely a feat! VIP Writer is probably the best word-processing program for the COCO.

I hope more of you take advantage of these seminars that we offer. This is one way of learning more about what your COCO can do for YOU.

KISS THE WATCH GOODBYE!!


Forgetful still has it and says "I FORGOT WHO LOANED IT TO ME!!"

Dapper Dan has been bringing his Compaq to the meetings and has been very helpful in getting us started on the DOS.



WHAT ABOUT THE 512K UPGRADE?

I haven't heard anything from Radio Shack yet! But in December's issue of Rainbow on page 105 SPECTRUM PROJECTS had advertised that the CoCo 3 512K upgrade would be coming soon along with a enhanced CoCo 3 DOS and they also have a new drawing program for the CoCo 3 called C-III GRAPHICS that uses the new enhanced graphic features ... use 320 *192 graphics, 16 of any 64 colors, save and load 32K screens and dual joystick button.




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
